Malawi

Malawi Trip Report

During the month of June, over 100 guests visited the African nation of Malawi to personally witness the amazing benefits being realized from their donations of VitaMeal through Nourish the Children and funds through the Force for Good Foundation. Each group spent three days in Malawi as follows:

BLESSINGS COMPLEX DAY

Each group listened to Napoleon Dzombe tell his story of how he rose from a poor family to become a successful businessman, and humanitarian who saved approximately 20,000 of his fellow citizens from starvation during a drought. Napoleon was recently named National Achiever by his nation. Napoleon owns and operates the VitaMeal plant and was the visionary behind the School of Agriculture for Family Independence. The group toured the plant to see how VitaMeal is made from local produce and to taste the finished product.

"The plant was so impressive—the workers were professional; loved their work; and seemed very engaged with the jobs they were assigned."

The groups then visited the Mtendere Orphanage which is located adjacent to the plant complex. Some of these children came to the orphanage so malnourished that they were not expected to survive. It is always a delight to visit and see how they are growing and thriving, thanks to VitaMeal and the excellent care they receive. The children sang for the visitors and a performer dressed in local costume showed the guests how the children exercise and dance, bringing visitors up to perform as well—much to the delight of the children. The group from South Korea joined the children in shelling corn from the cob, and the AEP (Americas/Europe/Pacific) group helped the children build and fly simple kites. Each group enjoyed talking to the children and learning about their hopes and dreams.

SAFI DAY

The Nu Skin Force for Good Foundation funds the School of Agriculture for Family Independence (SAFI) at Mtalimanja Village. Our guests were impressed with the verdant gardens, the expansive fish pool, the rammedearth chicken coops, and the fuel-saving hand-crafted stoves. Visitors helped in the fields and worked with farmer families to shell their corn. But perhaps the biggest treat was to visit with previous graduates. One reported that he had produced 10-20 bags of maiz on his farm before coming to SAFI, 80 bags at the school, and 120 bags on just part of his farm after returning home. At Mtalimanja we "teach a man to fish"...and to farm, so that they will never need a handout again. Some of the proceeds of VitaMeal purchases help to fund SAFI.

PROJECT DAY

Each group helped to hand out bags of VitaMeal to needy children sitting in long lines, waiting patiently in the African sun for the nutritious food. Each visitor group was divided into three teams to visit a variety of Feed the Children projects. All teams visited a Community-Based Child Care Center (CBCC) where children under five years of age gather each morning for nutritious VitaMeal and pre-school. Scientific evidence demonstrates the critical importance of good nutrition for young children as their minds and bodies develop. Teams visited orphanages, crisis nurseries, and programs to prevent the transmission of HIV/AIDS from mother to baby. Each personally witnessed the difference that their VitaMeal donation is making in Malawi.



"My favorite was the orphanage at the Sisters of Charity. The orphanage cares for infants and toddlers. We met a child who arrived there three weeks ago, malnourished, his parents just died, he was so bad he couldn't stand, and now, after three weeks of VitaMeal he is standing and gaining weight. The very complimentary article says, "It was in June 2002 that Nu Skin Enterprises, a company selling cosmetics and dietary supplements, initiated the program for the purpose of saving undernourished children around the world. When Nu Skin distributors and customers order VitaMeal, the purchased amount is produced at the plant and delivered to children. This is a system that allows distributors and consumers to improve the lives of children...what's unique about this initiative is that the distribution of VitaMeal is not everything. First, by building a local plant, it has created employment...the initiative also makes focused efforts in agricultural education to provide opportunities for many farmers to achieve independence by improving crop productivity."

Nourish the Children works because of all of you who donate food so generously to help distant children. Those who visited Malawi had the privilege of actually handing a bag of donated food to a child and dishing VitaMeal into cups and bowls for ragged, hungry children. Malawi Child Update

While visiting Malawi, some of the guests visited the Agape Earth Angels Orphanage and were excited to meet children featured years ago in our Destination Reports. Here are their stories and a new photo from our visit. All of these children are now thriving at the orphanage.

TAYLEA

(April 2007 Destination Report) "Taylea was found in a small, dirty room behind a local motel near Lilongwe, Malawi. Her father had just died, along with two siblings, and her mother was very ill with TB, AIDS, and malnutrition. Three-month-old Taylea weighed just two pounds, and also had TB and AIDS. Her mother would die soon, so friends asked Dianne Block of the Earth Angels Care Center to take little Taylea and try to save her. Taylea's mother cried and said she wanted Taylea to die with her, and held her in her arms. Two days later, friends again came to Dianne, informing her that Taylea's mother had died, and that little Taylea would also die soon if Dianne didn't come and save her.

Taylea was rescued and brought to the care center, malnourished and very ill. Taylea could not suckle, and had no mother to feed her anyway. Dianne thinned the VitaMeal with water, and began feeding her small amounts with an eyedropper. The drops were placed in her mouth as often as she would tolerate. Soon little Taylea began to thrive.

In February, at 22 months old, Taylea was wearing a pretty blue dress and weighing 24 pounds. She is a sweet girl and smart, speaking English and Chichewa. Taylea receives monthly treatments for HIV and TB. She enjoys laughing and playing with the other children, singing, dancing, and swinging in the garden. Taylea likes to be in charge and to teach the other children."

TERESA, EMMA AND RAMONA

(June 2007 Destination Report) "Teresa, Emma and Ramona are sisters from the Centi village near Lilongwe. They were found along the village road with their older brother begging for food. Both parents have died from AIDs. Eight-year-old Teresa looked like a walking skeleton, but had 9-month-old Ramona carefully tied on her back and little 2-year-old Emma was grasping her hand. Emma was tiny and her hair was red from malnutrition. Baby Ramona was unconscious, malnourished, and very sick, weighing only three pounds. Teresa was trying to feed her little sisters.



Dianne Block of the Earth Angel's Care Center went to the village chief and requested that she take the children so they could be given nutritious food and medical care. After much persuasion, the three girls were given over to Dianne's care. The boy was healthier and could work, so he was kept in the village. Diane felt Ramona would die within a few hours. She washed her little body, trying to get her clean and neat for her death and burial. After Dianne lovingly cleaned her body for the third time, Ramona began to stir. Dianne, ever optimistic, got out the eyedropper, and began regular feedings with thinned VitaMeal, supplied by Napoleon. Before long, Ramona began to thrive.

Today, Teresa is a healthy, happy nine year old. She said she wants to be a doctor when she grows up so she can help sick people. Five year-old Emma is happy and healthy and loved her first year of school. Little Ramona is a typical, playful three year-old. VitaMeal has given the sisters a second chance at life. All three girls have tested free of AIDS and TB."

During our visit we had a wonderful conversation with these delightful girls and Teresa still wants to be a doctor.



These kids are alive today because of caring caregivers and VitaMeal donations. Was it your donation that saved them?

Malawi Announcement

NTC partner in Malawi, Feed the Children, was thrilled to report that through USAID and the Procter and Gamble Corporation, they have been granted over 28 million water purifying sachets to help the people of Malawi over the next five years. Jim Campbell, FTC Country Director, described in the following announcement how this program would be combined with the VitaMeal nutrition program in Community-Based Child Care Centers:

"Feed The Children is working with local organizations which are based in the villages and ... are called **Community Based Childcare Centers (CBCCs)**. FTC provides VitaMeal (a vitamin and protein fortified porridge) and Water Guard (a point-of-use water sanitizer) to the child centers through the CBO's. The Water Guard program recently started while VitaMeal has been provided for almost a year. While I was distributing Water Guard, I visited one of the CBCCs in Salima called Chindugwa. The children at this center gather every morning from 8 am to 11 am; they have a number of activities that kids enjoy, which include writing, reading, counting, and playing with their little broken toys and dolls. Before they call it a day, kids enjoy VitaMeal porridge, they say they can't go home without VitaMeal.



Water Guard Powder has been distributed to Chindungwa for the second month now. While I was at the village visiting the kids, I met a little girl named **Shalifa Matola Bwanamali**. Shalifa is one of the beneficiaries of both Water Guard and VitaMeal. At the age of four, Shalifa is already doing a number of household chores. I asked her if she knows anything about Water Guard, and Shalifa explained in her own vernacular, "I like drinking water which has been mixed with Water Guard because water smells good and they are nice to drink. I used to feel pain in my belly whenever I drank water without Water Guard, but now I enjoy the water and I don't feel pain anymore, and neither do my friends at school. My mom prepares water for us at home while our teachers prepare for us at School (the CBCC)," When I asked her if she knows who brought the water guard to their village, Shalifa says what she knows. "My Mom told me

that the people who brought phala (VitaMeal) also bring Water Guard for us to drink nice and fresh water."

We are so pleased that the children who receive VitaMeal in Malawi will not have to face diarrhea and illness that come from contaminated water that can prevent the absorption of the 25 vitamins and minerals contained in VitaMeal. Congratulations and thank you to Feed the Children!

NU SKIN CONGRATULATES PHILANTHROPIC PARTNER ON NATIONAL HUMANITARIAN AWARD

Napoleon Dzombe Recognized for a Lifetime of Service in Malawi

Long-time partner of Nu Skin Enterprises and Malawian businessman and philanthropist Napoleon Dzombe received the 2009 Nation Achiever Award to recognize the impact his generosity and business and educational ventures have had on the people of Malawi. Sponsored by Malawi's national newspaper, the award recognizes individuals and groups that made a unique and outstanding contribution to their communities in 2009.

"We congratulate Napoleon for this well-deserved recognition and we are pleased to be associated with him in improving the lives of his fellow Malawians," said Blake Roney, chairman of Nu Skin Enterprises. "Napoleon has played an integral part in the humanitarian projects we've partnered in and his life-long devotion to improving the self-sufficiency of his nation is truly inspiring."

The partnership between Dzombe and Nu Skin culminated in 2007 with the dedication of Mtalimanja Village to house the School of Agriculture for Family Independence (SAFI). This school, a long-time dream of Dzombe's, teaches farmers how to improve their agricultural outcomes and be able to sustain their families. Dzombe partnered with the Nu Skin Force for Good Foundation to build Mtalimanja in 2006. It was named by the local people and means "long arms that give."

Mtalimanja Village is home to 30 to 40 families for two years, while they live on site with their families and attend SAFI to learn more effective agricultural techniques. Husbands and wives both attend classes and children are also educated and cared for. Maize yields at SAFI are triple what the average farmer harvests. In 2009, the first class of 33 families graduated and returned to their homes to implement their new knowledge and share it with their communities.

Nu Skin's relationship with Dzombe began in 2003 when he helped distribute VitaMeal, an enriched corn and soy porridge developed and manufactured by Nu Skin to meet the nutrition needs of children. Nu Skin's Nourish the Children initiative sells and facilitates the donation of VitaMeal to charity partners that distribute the food to those who need it most. In 2004, Nu Skin partnered with Dzombe to build the Madalitso VitaMeal Plant and benefit the local economy by producing VitaMeal in Malawi. The plant employs nearly 60 workers and supports hundreds of farmers with a market for their crop. Approximately 60,000 bags of VitaMeal, each containing 30 child-sized meals, are produced and distributed every month.

In addition to these projects, Dzombe has built Mtendere orphanage for hundreds of children and Blessings Hospital, a large medical facility that has treated more than 40,000 patients. Dzombe is best known for having provided food and water to fellow Malawians during the country's devastating drought in 2001 and 2002. His efforts saved more than 20,000 lives. He is still helping individuals today in his "Problems" office.

South Africa

After hosting Malawi tours, Brent Goddard, Managing Director of Nourish the Children, had the opportunity to visit the VitaMeal production facility and humanitarian projects in South Africa. VitaMeal produced in South Africa is similar to the product made in Malawi, a maiz and soya bean porridge with 25 vitamins and minerals, but the product comes in five different flavors that meet the needs of the projects that receive the food. Brent flew to Kimberly, South Africa to visit projects supported by Nu Skin's partner Hunger and Thirst. He reported, "I was very impressed that Hunger and Thirst leverages the food donations to substantially improve lives. Their overall objective is to help children escape poverty so they provide jobs to high school graduates that can't find work to help tutor, mentor, and teach younger children who perform poorly in school. One principal, Mr. Chabalala reported that the percentage of students passing the 6th grade in his school increased from 75% to 90% in one quarter with the program. Talk about synergy the children come to an after school program for free nutritious food and they are tutored to improve their education and life skills by graduates who would be unemployed if it weren't for this program. Many volunteers participate as mentors and staff. This program is all about hope." After returning from his visit, Brent received the following program details and visit photos:

Dear Brent,

We have been actively working in previously disadvantaged communities for the past four years. In this time, we have seen the need for food in communities where meals are few and far between. A greater need, as Maslow's law states, is to belong and to have self-esteem. We have seen this in our program and the self-worth and influence in the community is seen where we are active. Food and Support work

hand in hand in realizing the dream of not only bringing hope, but also

bringing change.

Support Centre:

For every 1,000 children in our program, the Support Centers will create 109 jobs: 2 Overseers, 11 Mentors, 67 Coaches (Matriculates), and a 29 member Food Team. The job descriptions of each are as follows:

Overseer:

The post of Overseer is the management of the Support Centre Staff and the day-to-day responsibilities of the Centre. This entails everything from making sure the food is ready and the coaches are happy and ensuring a good relationship with the community and school where the Support Centre is established.

Mentor:

These are mature members of the community who are respected. The mentor is our emotional and moral connection to the child in the program. The mentor teaches our 12-Key Leadership program and spends time with the children on a daily basis, discussing life, problems at home and school, as well as hopes and dreams. Each mentor sees no more than 45 children a day in groups of 15. This happens during the day in the Support Centre where quality time is allocated for building relationships.







Coach:

The coaches are matriculates who finished school and have no job. Each coach is responsible for 15 children and helping them with their homework and sports training. They spend a lot of time with the children and are role models for them. Because the coaches are younger than the mentors, the children relate differently to them than the more mature authority figure of the mentor. After a year in our program, the coaches are evaluated and we help them to acquire a bursary to further their tertiary education.



Food Team:

This is an unskilled position and we strive to help people who have no qualifications. The food team prepares the meals that the children receive after school, as well as sports drink for sport time. The food teams are people that really want to make a difference in their community, but have no means to help. It is great to see the smiles in their eyes as they prepare the food.



Where we are Active:

We are training Support Centre Staff in six schools in the Northern Cape. This amounts to 4,416 children who need our support. We would like to thank you for the 10,000 bags of VitaMeal® you are currently donating to us. As you have said, "Success breeds success," and we need your help to expand our program and create even more jobs in the communities. We would like to invest our money in jobs that your food donations allow us to do. Additional food donations would free up money to help us roll-out our program and adopt the Bushman Community (!Xun & Khwe Community) of Platfontein, as they are in dire need, as you yourself have seen.



The Bushman Community (!Xun & Khwe Community) of Platfontein has 1,200 children who we would like to adopt apart from the 4,416 in our other Support Centers. This community suffers with domestic problems and alcoholism. To bring hope in these two broken communities, we have to establish a Support Centre that helps provide continuous improvement. In the past, a lot of people have tried to help these people, but because of the inconsistency, these communities have fallen into a deeper hole of despair.



We asked our Overseer, Doreen Bessies of our Barkly West Support Center, a few questions regarding the Support Center:

Q: How has your life changed since being a part of Hunger and Thirst Foundation?

A: "My life has changed dramatically since joining Hunger and Thirst. I feel stronger and feel like I can help bring change and face problems."



Q: Do you see a difference in your community where Hunger and Thirst is active?

A: "Yes, there is a difference. Wherever we go the people thank us for what we do in our community; they say the children have become more relaxed. Some of the parents walk far to come to the school just to thank us for what we do for their children."

Q: What in the community makes you sad to see?

A: "Child molestation, child abuse, and children that are troubled because their parents are jobless and parents that are constantly drunk. Drug abuse is a big problem especially among the youth."

We thank you for your support. In our eyes, you are a part of the team; we support the emotional and psychological needs and you support the physiological needs with the donation of VitaMeal.

China

Nu Skin Yushu Earthquake Relief Report

On April 14th, 2010, a 7.1-magnitude earthquake rocked Yushu County in Qinghai province in China. The number of deaths from the earthquake were estimated at 2,220, with 12,135 wounded and 90% of the buildings damaged or destroyed. Nu Skin responded immediately as described in the following Press Release:

"In response to the recent 7.1-magnitude earthquake in the Tibetan Yushu County of Qinghai Province, Nu Skin has donated more than \$1 million in cash and in-kind donations to aid the rescue workers and survivors."

"Nu Skin's mission is to be a force for good in the world and we are pleased to have resources to help in responding to natural disasters such as this earthquake," said Andrew Fan, Nu Skin president of the greater China region. "We will keep a close eye on the latest developments in the earthquake area and will continue to do our best to support the rescue work based on the specific needs in the disaster area. We appreciate the rescue workers for their tireless efforts and are confident that the local residents will be able to restore and rebuild their homes and livelihood."





Nu Skin's contribution included monetary donations to purchase rescue supplies and 10,000 activated carbon protective masks. In addition, the company also donated nutritional and personal care products, including 750,000 servings of VitaMeal and 3,000 bottles of waterless hand sanitizer.



Nu Skin has been an active supporter for disaster relief in China. In 2008, Nu Skin was recognized with the prestigious China Charity Award from the China Ministry of Civil Affairs for its contribution to the southern China snowstorm and Sichuan earthquake relief efforts.

We are so grateful to our charity partners, World Children's Fund, China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation and the China Children and Teenage Fund. And we are so grateful to all of our VitaMeal donors that you care enough to share.
